Letter from the Chief

As we enter December 2006, I want to wish everyone Seasons Greetings and Happy New Year from the UCSD GI Division. The Division has had a very productive year, with a number of changes and improvements that affect our core missions of clinical care, education, and research. The Division has added two new administrative assistants, Olivia Hernandez and Karen Kasser to help support these missions, and modified the role of a third, Rosalyn Lara, as the new Fellowship Coordinator. Regarding the fellowship, in addition to our new coordinator, we will continue to participate in the Medicine Subspecialties Match for the second consecutive year for fellow recruitment, and for the first time, rely on the Electronic Residency Application Service to receive applicant materials electronically, instead of paper. The UCSD fellows continue to receive training in broad areas of gastroenterology and its practice, with rotations that encompass the VA, UCSD Hillcrest and Thornton, Kaiser, Rady Children's and intermittently Navy Balboa hospitals. All fellows are performing basic and clinical research projects, with several submissions to the ACG, AASLD, and DDW meetings. Our fellowship is probably the most competitive and comprehensive training program on the West Coast. Clinically, the Division has begun new initiatives in inflammatory bowel disease, advanced endoscopic procedures, and colorectal cancer that will grow during 2007. Tom Savides, M.D., the new Clinical Services Chief for the GI Division, has also commenced several forays into continuing improving access and care delivery at our clinical sites. The Division has recruited Mike Docherty, M.D. for GI and Khaled Selim, M.D. for hepatology transplant, and additional GI and liver recruitments will be added during 2007, some of which are near fruition. Research-wise, Divisional members remain productive in their basic or clinical research, in publishing manuscripts (some of which are listed in this and each newsletter), and in obtaining grants to support their research. Scott Naugler, M.D., and Heather Year! Patton, M.D. joined as faculty members this past year, both with productive research agendas in liver investigation. The Division intends to compete for an NIH-funded

Faculty Highlights.....

Hui Dong, MD, PhD, Assistant Adjunct Professor of Medicine

Dr. Dong received his M.D. degree from Medical School at Yunan University in Kunming, China and his Ph.D. degree from Fundan University in Shanghai, China. He completed his postdoctoral training at University of Calgary in Canada. His areas of academic focus are: 1) cellular and molecular mechanisms of duodenal mucosal bicarbonate secretion, and its impairment in duodenal ulcers and cystic fibrosis; 2) expression and function of membrane ion channels and receptors on epi-thelium and smooth muscle.


Scott Naugler, M.D., Clinical Instructor in Medicine

Dr. Naugler graduated with honors from the University of Arkansas School of Medicine, He did his internship in Internal Medicine at Barnes Hospital at Washington University, St. Louis and completed his residency at Oregon Health Sciences University, including a Chief Residency year. He finished his GI fellowship at UC San Diego in June of 2006 and has been working as a clinical instructor for the GI division. Dr. Naugler's interests lie in liver regeneration, liver carcinogenesis, and hepatic transplant support.

Yuko Kono, M.D., Assistant Clinical Professor of Medicine

Dr. Kono graduated from Kyoto University, School of Medicine, Japan. She completed a residency at Kyoto University and Kyoto Katsura Hospital, and GI fellowship at Kyoto University. Her areas of academic focus are contrast-enhanced ultrasound imaging on liver disease and tumor angiogenesis. She is an expert of ultrasound imaging. Her clinical interest is in the management of cancer patients, especially hepatocellular carcinomas.


