In October 2007, Santa Ana winds drove wildfires that caused the evacuation of 600,000 people in San Diego county. Both of these events brought out the best of our faculty - everyone stepped up coverage for Dr. Moore's busy clinical schedule to minimize disruption to patients, and faculty and fellows alike helped cover the service while others had to evacuate their homes due to the uncontrolled nature of the fires. No one in our GI Division lost their home thankfully, but the selfless nature of our faculty and staff made these difficult times pass much easier. I applaud our faculty, fellows, and staff for their hard work during these challenging times.

The wildfires caused the rescheduling of our annual GI Research Retreat, which will now be held on Saturday, February 23, 2008 beginning at 8AM in the Eucalyptus Conference Center on the UCSD Campus. The theme of infection, inflammation and IBD dovetails with the commencement of our newly obtained NIH-funded UCSD Digestive Diseases Research Development Center for which the NIH has committed \$2.7M to enhance our research infrastructure over the next 5 years. The Center's theme is the continuum of inflammation to repair to transformation, which is the hallmark seen in esophagitis, gastritis, hepatitis, and colitis as these transform into esophageal, stomach, liver, and colon cancers. The Center's goal is to facilitate an understanding of these processes as it moves along this continuum.

In other events, UCSD successfully completed its surprise Joint Commission survey in October 2007, a commendation for the adherence to outstanding practice guidelines at our institution, and joins the VA San Diego Healthcare System, which successfully completed its survey in January 2007. UCSD is updating its webpage look and how information is presented, and the GI Division is doing the same. Dr. Brad Roderick Moore, 37, of San Diego, Calif., died Friday, September 21, 2007. Dr. Moore originally of Brandon, Mississippi, graduated from Jackson Preparatory School, Mississippi State University and the University of Mississippi Medical School. He did his residency at Fletcher Allen Medical Center in Burlington, Vermont. His specialty in Gastroenterology was completed at MUSC, Charleston, S.C. followed by 5 years practice at NEA Medical Clinic, Jonesboro, Ark. At the time of his death, Dr. Moore joined the faculty at University of California San Diego Medical Center in July 2007. He will be remembered as a devoted son, husband, father, brother, and friend and will be greatly missed by all. Survivors include his wife, Dr. Suzanne Moore; son Nicholas, age 5, and daughter Alexandra, age 1; his parents are Roderick and Jane Moore of Brandon, Mississippi; a sister, Nicole Ray, and her husband, Josh Ray, of Birmingham, Ala., with children Merill, Macy and Cole; his in-laws, Dewayne and Marian Smith of Marion, Ark. and sister-in-law and brother-in-law, Drs. Stephanie and Chris Gafford of Favetteville, Tenn. and their children Morgan and Rowan. The family will be establishing a scholarship in the name of

October 2007 San Diego Wildfires

Division of Gastroenterology ...Program Highlights William K. Warren Medical Research Center for Celiac Disease at UCSD

The William K. Warren Medical Research Center for Celiac Disease was established at UCSD in 2006 with a generous research grant from the Oklahoma-based William K. Warren Foundation. Celiac Disease is estimated to affect one in 100 Americans. Celiac Disease is triggered in genetically susceptible individuals in response to the ingestion of a common dietary protein called gluten, which is found in bread, pasta, cookies, pizza crust and other wheat, rye and barley-containing foods.

The mission of the Warren Center is to advance the knowledge of Celiac Disease pathogenesis and to develop novel diagnostic and therapeutic advances through basic, translational and clinical research. The Center's Celiac Disease clinics at UCSD aim to provide state-of-the-art clinical care and education to adults and children with Celiac Disease. Education activities include increasing the medical and local community's knowledge about Celiac Disease through community lectures, outreach and nutrition classes. Center members include Martin F. Kagnoff, M.D., Professor of Medicine and Pediatrics, Emeritus who is the center director, Hilde Cheroutre, Ph.D., Member, La Jolla Institute for Allergy & Immunology and Associate Professor of Medicine, UCSD, and Michael Karin, PhD, Professor of Pharmacology at UCSD. Gregory Harmon, M.D., directs the Adult Celiac Clinic located at the UCSD Perlman Outpatient Center. Kimberly Newton, M.D., will join the Warren Center to direct the Pediatric Celiac Clinic at Children's Hospital in January 2008, coming from The Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York City. Susan Algert, Ph.D., R.D., the center's nutritionist, offers patients nutrition counseling & medical nutrition therapy for Celiac Disease, as well as classes on "Living Healthy Gluten-Free".

The center's Scientific Advisory Board members include Lloyd F. Mayer, M.D., Professor of Medicine and Director, Immunobiology, Mt. Sinai Medical Center; Ludvig M. Sollid, M.D., Ph.D., Professor, Institute of Immunology University of Oslo, Norway; Chaitan Khosla, Ph.D., Professor of Chemistry, Stanford University; Bana Jabri, M.D., Ph.D., Professor of Pathology, University of Chicago; and D. Brent Polk, M.D, Professor of Pediatrics and Head, Division of Pediatric Gastroenterology, Vanderbilt University.

Community Advisory Board Members include Karen Fine, Founder of Gluten Free Foundation; Roxie Johnson, Founder of Gluten Free in San Diego; Danna Korn, Author and Founder of Raising Our Celiac Kids (R.O.C.K.) and Gluten Freedom; and Elaine Monarch, Founder of the Celiac Disease Foundation.

The Warren Center Research Lecture Series features recognized experts in the field throughout the year. Hans-Christian Reinecker, M.D, from Harvard Medical School and Massachusetts General Hospital recently gave the first lecture of the 2007-2008 series entitled "Immune Surveillance of Epithelial Interfaces."

The William. K. Warren, Jr. Prize for Excellence in Celiac Disease Research is an award (\$25,000) presented annually to an individual whose research is judged to make a significant contribution to the field of Celiac Disease Research. The 2007 recipient of the award was Ludvig M. Sollid, M.D., Ph.D., Professor at the Institute of Immunology, University of Oslo, Norway. His lecture "A Journey Into Celiac Disease Research" was presented as part of a day-long research symposium held at UCSD in March 2007. Nominations for the 2008 Warren Prize are being accepted until December 10, 2007. Nominations are open to individuals from the United States and abroad. Significant accomplishments of the recipient may encompass basic, translational, and/or clinical research. The 2008 recipient will be selected by an expert scientific review committee. In February/March 2008, an award presentation will be held and the recipient will present their research as part of the 2007-2008 Warren Research Lecture Series at UCSD.

The Pilot Feasibility Award is a \$25,000 grant awarded to new investigators or established investigators who do not currently conduct research on Celiac Disease. The primary goal of the program is to provide awardees with funds to develop new Celiac Disease related research initiatives that will lead to submission of competitive grant applications. The center is actively involved in educational activities and events for the community. A community lecture entitled "What You Need to Know About Celiac Disease and the Gluten-free Diet" was held in September. Dr. Kagnoff presented on how Celiac Disease affects the body, Dr. Harmon covered diagnosis and treatment, and Dr. Algert discussed how to keep the disease under control with a gluten-free diet. The program was filmed and premiered on UCSD-TV on November 29 at 8:00 pm. Additional dates and times the program will air can be found on the center website, at http://celiaccenter.ucsd.edu. Dr. Algert has taught classes for adults and children with Celiac Disease on a number of topics, including Living Healthy Gluten-Free" including label reading tips and how to identify hidden gluten, "No Gluten, No Problem: Getting the Nutrients You Really Need," and "Healthy Gluten-Free School and Party Ideas for Kids".

In early November the center partnered with the fine dining restaurant Azul in La Jolla for a gluten-free cooking class. An audience of 20 watched and learned from talented Chef Orion Balliet as he demonstrated three gluten-free recipes that have been featured on the Azul menu. While Chef Orion prepared Roasted Butternut Squash & Caramelized Apple Soup, Quinoa, Chanterelle & Cabbage Stuffing, and Winter Cranberry & Almond Crisp with Vanilla Marscarpone, he provided the group with tips on eating out at fine dining establishments while still maintaining a strict gluten-free diet. Future classes will include gluten-free healthy eating guidelines for chocolate lovers in February, and a "hands-on" class for teens where they will learn more about what causes Celiac Disease and how to effectively manage day-to-day activities while maintaining their gluten-free diet.

Drs. Algert, Harmon and Kagnoff are starting a study in adult gluten-sensitive patients that will test the hypothesis that improved health literacy or knowledge of the gluten-free diet leads to better compliance and health outcomes. The study will be conducted at the Clinical Research Center outpatient facility on campus. A study conducted to evaluate the content and quality of medical information available to patients with Celiac Disease and gluten sensitivity on the internet is now being completed. Other collaborations on developing new biomarkers for disease have been initiated with the University of California, Santa Barbara. Initiation of a Celiac Disease database and registry is being developed in conjunction with bioinformatics faculty in the Department of Medicine at UCSD.

The UCSD GI Division was founded in 1970 by Henry Wheeler, M.D. who served as its first Division Chief. Later, Jon I. Isenberg, M.D. led the Division from 1979 to 1993, followed by C. Richard Boland, M.D. from 1995 to 2003, and currently by John M. Carethers, M.D., since 2004. The GI fellowship Training Program commenced in 1974 and the NIH Training Grant was initially funded in 1976. The Division has trained several local gastroenterologists in San Diego, as well as developed several academicians at University-based medical schools, including some with leadership and administrative positions.

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
